"September, The Month of Renewal!"

It is truly amazing that summer has finally come to an end. If we look back from last September, one can only imagine the fun and excitement that his year has brought to our parish. It has been a

wonderful year filled with anticipation, surprises and an immense amount of success.

Throughout my personal experience, the month of September has always been a month for new beginnings. According to the church's calendar, September is always designated as the "New Ecclesiastical Year." With this in mind, I would like to begin my article with the topic, "SEPTEMBER, THE MONTH OF RENEWAL."

You are probably wondering why I chose the topic of "Renewal." The Webster's Dictionary defines the would "Re-

newal" as "the act of renewing or of forming a anew." In other words, to make a new again, completeness or perfection. This word is well known within the religious world and in the church building block for perfection. Therefore, this is what we are going to focus on—"the Renewal of our Souls."

Before we begin speaking about the subject of Spiritual Renewal, we must first understand and practice the Sacrament of Repentance. Over the past centuries, our Orthodox Church has undergone various positive evolutionary stages. We are the Church, which on one hand is becoming more and more capable of proclaiming its historical spiritual values and ethos, while on the other hand; it is more actively manifesting itself as the Body of Christ, which gathers to give thanks to God the Father in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist (Holy Communion). It is within the word "Renewal," that this Church, the body of the faithful, must continually purify and repent itself if Renewal is to continue. As a church, we can only grow spiritually if we continue to repent for our sins. Thus, it is only through repentance that the church can continually be renewed by the Holy Spirit.

Without repentance, the church, comprised of

Hierarchy, Priest and the faithful, will not be able to sustain the blows of the pluralistic and secularist society. As a church, we are confronted everyday with temptation and delusion. We are constantly being put to the test. Our greatest fear in today's society is that the people are trying to change the very nature and vision of the church. Therefore, we must be cautious about how we express our belief in Christ. Take fore example the Holy Apostles. If we examine the missionary spirit of the Holy Apostles, we can admire the ways in which they confronted the difficult stages of their lives, as opposed to

the way Satan would want us to approach our lives. Satan wants all of us to feel successful, to have our church banks accounts filled to the brim However, we must remain wary, and not be lured or seduced by the would because of the slight change of frightening possibility of total disaster instead of success. Even through we have everything going right for us, we as a church can be reduced to a clanging bell, a mere shell with little or no content and life within the church.

In the Orthodox Theology, what has been seen to be successful is to travel back to the basis of our roots. In other words, we must go back to our liturgical, biblical and patristic roots, and bring back the old traditions and culture of the church. As stated previously, we need to become more adherent and attracted to the liturgical life of the church. If we came to church with our family and worshiped our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ during the Divine Liturgy, we would have the opportunity to witness the true glory of God's presence in our

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lives. Attending church allows us to personally and spiritually witness the wisdom of God through His Word. What a wonderful experience each family would have if they just brought themselves the commit their lives to Christ Jesus. As a result, this would be a much better place to live in. We would never fear of abuse one another or bring harm against each other. All it takes is a true commitment to Christ.

Unfortunately, committing ourselves to Christ is not an easy thing to do in the society we live in today. We are always ready to accept what the American culture provides for us, which often times can be destructive. Let us accept that our church, which is Hierarchical by nature, is quickly becoming to us, a mere appearance. This is because we have strayed away from the ideals of the church. We have taken prayer and fasting and other spiritual tools and practices out of our daily life. Here are a few questions that we as Christians should ask, so that we may consider altering our lives to be closer to Christ.

 \checkmark When was the last time your family came together to pray?

✓ Have you established a time for prayer in your household?
 ✓ When was the last time you sat down with your family to discuss religion as well as other important topics?

 \checkmark When was the last time you shared an important or interesting book with your family?

✓ When was the last time you attended church as a family?
✓ When was the last time you attended the Divine Liturgy to receive Holy Communion as a family?

If we claim that we are spiritual and that we are truly believers in Christ, then we must prove it to Him. After truthfully answering these questions, we must rejuvenate the old soul within ourselves to create a new outlook on life.

I would like to share a story with about a young man who once told me that in the beginning of his life, he rarely felt the need to attend church. He stated to me that his parents were never really churchgoers, and when it came time to wake up on Sunday mornings, attending church was not a priority. One day, this young man attended his uncle's funeral at St. Nicholas, and during the eulogy, he paid close attention to what the priest was saying. Whatever he heard, that day changed his attitude and love toward the church. He now attends church regularly and is extremely happy with his parish. This young man has renewed his spirit in Christ Jesus. He has turned his life completely around because he had the opportunity to be touched by God.

This inspiring story is an example of what Spiritual Renewal is all about. It should be a new change for all of us. If you are struggling and feeling depressed, and believe that there is no one to turn to, you are undoubtedly mistaken. **You must turn to Jesus Christ, who truly is the true physi**-

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September-Σεπτέμβοιος, 2009 KOINONIA Reflections on the Birth of the Mother of God

The Feast of the Nativity of our Most Holy Lady, the Theotokos, and Ever Virgin Mary, is celebrated each year on September 8th. The Feast commemorates the birth of the Mother of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

It is most appropriate that the Feast is the first major feast after the beginning of the Church's annual cycle on September 1. The proximity of the two events serves to emphasize that the birth of the Virgin Mary is the event that marks the beginning of God the Father's plan to send His Son, through the Incarnation, into the world to accomplish mankind's redemption.

Just as the Church understands Christ's Incarnation as an event planned by God before all ages, it also recognizes the birth of the Theotokos as similarly preordained by God's divine providence. For this reason, just as the Church discerns the prophetic foretelling of the coming of Christ in the Old Testament, it also finds many direct and indirect suggestions of the Panagia in the Hebrew scriptures.

For instance, the burning bush and the Ark of the Covenant in Exodus, both of which held the glory of God and were not consumed by His presence are perceived by the Church as types of; that is, pointing to, the Virgin Mary whose womb held the eternal divine Son of God. And, of course, the prophet Isaiah's "virgin" who would conceive and bear a son is understood as an unmistakable allusion to the Panagia.

Because of these references and others to the Virgin Mary in the Old Testament, the Church understands her to be the last and greatest of the saints of Old Covenant Israel and the first and greatest saint of the true and New Israel of God, the Church. She is considered the living historical link between the promises of God to the Hebrew people to send them a Savior and the fulfillment of that promise. As such, she is, by being the living vessel through which the eternal World of God assumed flesh and entered the world, the divinely decreed instrument by which heaven, earth, God and man are eternally united and all creation is redeemed. Because of her role in the Incarnation Orthodox Christians celebrate with great joy the birth of the Theotokos (God-Bearer, Mother of God) as she was proclaimed by the Third Ecumenical Council. Although she is held in the highest esteem, she is honored not so much for her self, praiseworthy as that may be, but precisely because she is the Mother of the Lord.

By highly respecting and reverencing the Virgin Mary the Fathers of the Church understood that they were advancing and preserving a proper understanding of Christ as the fully divine only begotten Son of God. Accurately recognizing Christ's full divinity demands that the Virgin Mary be honored and venerated.

The Church's grasp of the Theotokos' role in God's plan of salvation is made quite clear in the hymns sung during the Feast of Virgin Mary's Nativity. She is called among other titles "Temple and Throne of God" and "Bridge of Life".

The hymns and texts of the services celebrating the Feast are drawn primarily from the second century Book of James or Protoevangelion. This non-canonical book, along with the Gospel accounts of the Theotokos, was extremely influential in shaping the early Church's exalted attitude towards the Virgin Mary. It recounts her divinely planned and angelically announced birth to the aged Joachim and Anna, her miraculous infancy and childhood and her dedication to the Temple.

As Archbishop Kallistos Ware has pointed out, the fact that the Orthodox Church does not include the Protoevangelion of James in the Canon of Holy Scripture makes it possible to assent to the profound spiritual truth and reality which the story of the Panagia's birth reveals without having to ascribe precise historical correctness to the story.

This great truth is that the Virgin Mary from her birth and before was chosen by God to play the most unique and unparalleled role of any human being in God's plan of salvation. In her womb the union of God and man was accomplished. A union that would free humanity from the curse of sin and death, grant mankind eternal life, redeem all of creation, and inaugurate the everlasting kingdom of God.

Σκέψεις για την Γέννηση της Μητέρας Του Θεού

Κάθε χρόνο, τις 8 Σεπτεμβρίου γιορτάζομε το Γενέθλιον της Υπεραγίας Δεσποίνης ημών Θεοτόχου και Αειπαρθένου Μαρίας. Η εορτή τιμά την γέννηση της Μητέρας του Κυρίου και Σωτήρος μας, Ιησού Χριστού.

Είναι χαφαχτηφιστικό το ότι η εοφτή της γεννήσεως της Θεοτόχου είναι η πφώτη μεγάλη εοφτή μετά την έναφξη του Λειτουφγικού έτους, 1η Σεπτεμβφίου. Τα δύο αυτά γεγονότα είναι πολύ κοντά το ένα με το άλλο. Τούτο, για να τονιστεί, ότι η γέννηση της Παφθένου Μαφίας σημειώνει την αφχή του σχεδίου του Θεού να στείλει τον Υιόν Του στον κόσμο, με την ενανθφώπισή Του, για να επιτύχει την λύτρωση του ανθφώπινου γένους.

Όπως η Εκκλησία εννοεί την ενανθρώπιση του Χριστού σαν ένα γεγονός προσχεδιασμένο από τον Θεό, με τον ίδιο τρόπο αναγνωρίζει την γέννηση της Θεοτόκου, σαν γεγονός, το ίδιο προσχεδιασμένο, από την Θεία Πρόνοια.

Για τον ίδιο λόγο, η Εκκλησία, όχι μόνο διακρίνει την προφητεία του ερχομού του Χριστού στην Παλαιά Διαθήκη, αλλά βρίσκει επίσης στις Εβραϊκές γραφές πολλές άμεσες και έμμεσες αναφορές στην Παναγία.

Για παφάδειγμα, η φλεγόμενη βάτος, και η Κιβωτός της Διαθήκης του Κυφίου, στην «Έξοδο», που δεν καταναλώθηκαν από την παφουσία Του, και που δείχνουν τη δόξα του Θεού, θεωφούνται από την Εκκλησία σαν γεγονότα που αναφέφονται στην Παναγία Μαφία, που κυοφόφησε την αιώνια θεότητα του Υιού του Θεού.

Η προφητεία του Ησαϊα για την «Παρθένα», που θα συλλάβει και θα γεννήσει γιο, θεωρείται, αναμφισβήτητα, ότι υπαινίσσεται την Παναγία.

Λόγω αυτών των αναφορών και άλλων για την Παναγία στην Παλαιά Γραφή, η Εκκλησία μας θεωρεί την Παναγία σαν την τελευταία και μεγαλύτερη των αγίων του Παλαιού Ισραήλ και σαν την πρώτη και μεγαλύτερη των αγίων του Νέου Ισραήλ του Θεού, της Εκκλησίας.

PROPER CHURCH ETIQUETTE

There are various parts of the Liturgy during which no one should be moving about. <u>Wherever a person happens</u> to be at these moments, he or she should stop and stand reverently, until the proper time to go to the pew.

These are parts of the Liturgy where no one should enter the church.

- **1.** During the Procession of the Priest and the Altar Boys with the Holy Gospel.
- 2. During the reading of the EPISTLE and the Gospel.
- **3.** During the SERMON.
- **4.** During the CHERUBIC HYMN and the Procession of the Priest and the Altar Boys with the Holy Gifts.
- 5. During the recitation of the CREED (in which the whole Congregation should participate).
- **6.** During the SE YMNOUMEN and the prayers of the Consecration of the Holy Gifts.
- **7.** During the LORD'S PRAYER in which the whole Congregation should participate.
- 8. During HOLY COMMUNION.
- 9. During the Dismissal Prayers.
- **10.** During any special Services (Memorial Services, Processions, Special Prayers, etc.)

One basic rule to follow is that, whenever the Priest is outside of the Altar either with the Censer or giving the Blessing, everyone should stand wherever they are and not be walking around

According to actual Church Service procedures, each and every member of the Congregation is required to be seated in the pews at the beginning of the Service. It is only by leniency that anyone is allowed to enter the Church once the Services have begun. Thus, we ask that you do not take undue advantage of this leniency. Also Liturgy Books are available in the pews to follow the service.

Please remember that the Parish Council members are required to maintain order during Church Services. Thank you for following their direction.

Welcome back to another exciting year of Greek School. Last year, the Greek School program was successfully expanded with the hiring of two new teachers, Vasiliki Kalogranis and Evgenia Kanakis. Due to their extensive teaching experience, the school was able to offer a Preschool and Kindergarten program for children ages 3 to 7 years old as well as Advance Greek Studies. The school enrolled 18 children for the school year 2008-2009 in the Preschool and Kindergarten program. Student's excelled in the program and showcased their talents at the End of Year Greek School Ceremonies.

With Mrs. Kanakis' assistance, the school program expanded to include Advanced Greek Studies for those students graduating from the 6th grade who wished to advance their Greek language. Οι Ύμνοι και τα κείμενα των ακολουθιών, που τιμούν την εορτή, προέρχονται, κυρίως, από το βιβλίο του Ιακώβου ή το Πρωτοευαγγέλιο, που γράφτηκε τον δεύτερο αιώνα. Το βιβλίο αυτό, που δεν περιλαμβάνεται στον «Κανόνα» της Εκκλησίας μας, μαζί με τις αναφορές του Ευαγγελίου για την Θεοτόκο, επηρέασαν πάρα πολύ την υψηλή θέση που έδωσε η Εκκλησία μας, από την αρχή της ίδρυσής της, προς την Θεοτόκο. Όπως επισήμανε ο Επίσχοπος Κάλλιστος Ware, το γεγονός ότι η Εχκλησία δεν συμπεφιλαμβάνει το Πφωτοευαγγέλιο του Ιαχώβου στον «Κανόνα» των αγίων γφαφών, είναι πιθανό να πφοέφχεται από την βαθειά πνευματική αλήθεια και πφαγματικότητα με την οποία φανεφώνεται η Γέννηση της Παναγίας, χωφίς να χφειάζεται κανείς να αναφεφθεί σε ακφιβή ιστοφική αλήθεια.

Η μεγάλη αλήθεια είναι ότι, η Παρθένος Μαρία, από την γέννησή Της, αλλά και πριν από αυτήν, είχε εκλεγεί από τον Θεόν να παίξει τον μοναδικό και απαράμιλλο ρόλο στο σχέδιο Του για την σωτηρία των ανθρώπων. Ο «καρπός της κοιλίας της» ήταν η εκπλήρωση της ένωσης Θεού και ανθρώπου. Μία ένωση, που, θα ελευθέρωνε την ανθρωπότητα από την κατάρα της αμαρτίας και του θανάτου, θα χάριζε στο ανθρώπινο γένος την αιώνια ζωή, θα λύτρωνε όλη την πλάση, και θα εγκαινίαζε την αιώνια βασιλεία του Θεού.

Let us not take away the opportunity for our children to hear the Word of God and be doers of His Word. Let us all share Christ's love with everyone that we come into contact with.
